His research interests are in Indigenous research methodologies, intergenerational cultural capital, intergenerational cultural knowledge transmission, critical autoethnography, indigenous masculinities, comparative education, and sport and health education.

Dr Mo'ale 'Otunuku is a research fellow at the Institute of Education (IOE), University of the South Pacific. Mo'ale has worked in education for more than 25 years both in New Zealand and in Tonga – as teacher, head of department, deputy principal and lecturer. His area of research interest include assessment, indigenous methodologies, and achievement of Pacific Island students.
